


- We sang, played music and entertained the senior citizens. The boys and girls all remarked on the joy they could see on the faces of the elderly people.

- We are a very lucky school because we have an Educational Centre for Disabled Children attached to our school.
- Every lunch time we all take turns to visit the ECPD and play with the boys and girls.

Charity Work.
